Suggested Hummingbird Plants for Kansas by Chuck Otte, Geary County Extension Agent, Retired

Hummingbirds will feed on more than just red flowers. Red simply grabs their attention. Quality and quantity of nectar is important! Most of these are also good for all pollinators.

Salvia (Salvia species) - Traditional, such as Vista Red or Flare or some of the newer varieties like Lady-in-Red or Summer Jewel.

Agastache (Agastache sp.) - many different cultivars, both perennial and annuals.

Trumpet Creeper or Trumpet Vine (*Campsis radicans*)- native to Kansas but can be very aggressive. Needs a lot of space. Use with caution! (But hummingbirds love it!)

Scarlet Runner Bean (*Phaseolus coccineus*) - an heirloom climbing dry bean cultivar with red flowers. Beans are edible.

Cardinal Climber (*Quamoclit sloteri*) - climbing vining plant with red flowers. Very frost tender.

Cardinal Flower (Lobelia cardinalis) - A native perennial with brilliant red flowers. Good choice for damp locations.

Beebalm (Monarda didyma) - Very attractive to hummingbirds and pollinators.

Butterfly Bush (*Buddleia davidii*) - May be more attractive to pollinators than hummingbirds but a nice shrub.

Hollyhock (*Alcea rosea*) - A classic that's available in full size and dwarf cultivars.

Rose of Sharon (*Hibiscus syriacus*) - Shrub that blooms later in the summer - makes a nice screen.

Canna (Canna species) - Use red cultivars to get the hummingbird's attention and then other colors to add diversity.

Zinna (Zinna species) - A classic annual that's easy and adaptable. Full sun.
